Praying with Children at Home

The Rosary - It can be a challenge to pray the family Rosary! Yet this has been a true mainstay of prayer in the home for many centuries. And in places and times where priests were unable to minister to their people (like Ireland during the Penal Laws, or Japan when borders were closed to all foreigners, and even here in Australia during colonial times), it was the daily gathering of the family each evening to pray the Rosary that kept the Faith alive.

But how to do it in these days when all of us (not just the children) are so dependent upon constant visual stimulation in order to maintain our attention? Some ideas:
 - Our parish website has all the Mysteries of the Rosary on its livestream archive. The pictures and short scripture texts can help everyone to maintain a prayerful focus.
 - Gatto's shop has some nice picture books and colouring books. Show pictures as you pray.
 - Start with just one decade, and work up from there. (More ideas next weekend.)



Pastoral Ponderings

I'm grateful to so many of you who expressed strong support for my homily about Ukraine last weekend. A number of people had no idea about the Budapest Memorandum which obliges Russia to respect the territorial sovereignty of Ukraine, and also obliges the United Nations to uphold the independence of Ukraine.

It's so important that we all accept our share in the effort to support Ukraine. The sudden rise in our petrol prices is a way in which we can actively stand by this poor people who are now suffering so much at the hands of Putin's tyranny. As I said last weekend, it's better to pay more for petrol than to send our soldiers to die far from home.

Nevertheless, there is still more to be done. This coming Friday, 25th March, the Solemnity of the Lord's Annunciation, Pope Francis will consecrate Russia and Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary - hopefully fulfilling the request made by Our Lady at Fatima in 1917.

It would be wonderful if you could come to 5.45pm Mass this Friday to join in this Solemn Act of Consecration. If you can stay for Stations of the Cross and Benediction afterwards, all the better.

"More things are wrought through prayer than this world dreams of" said Alfred, Lord Tennyson (1809-1892). We who are believers should not only know this, but actively practise it by praying daily.

Last week in the central column I gave some ideas for praying at home in the morning and evening. Today there are some ideas about praying the Rosary, with more to follow next week.

Do you ever share prayer suggestions with one another when you parents are gathering socially? It might be very worthwhile.

I started this column by mentioning rising petrol prices. Food prices are also going up, due to the cost of transporting goods across the country - trucks and trains need fuel, too. So on it goes.

If you follow the Income and Expenses items in this parish newsletter each weekend, you can see that rising costs are a concern for the parish, too. I try not to mention this too much, but it is a very real concern for me. I worry about it, but I pray.

This has affected our Building Project, too: finding a place for me to live when the Presbytery is torn down is hard because the rental market has exploded and rents are high. And the construction industry is suffering: some companies have folded, costs have increased, and interest rates are going up. So I pray a lot at night when I can't sleep! St Joseph, help us.
