Praying with Children at Home

The Rosary - In my little series of articles about prayer with children, I gave some history of the Rosary last weekend, plus some basic ideas. Here are some more:

- Don't try to get small children to pray an entire Rosary with you at home; you'll be asking for trouble! They're little! And if we adults have problems trying to remain focussed during the Rosary, why should we inflict this upon little ones.

- However, we should 'feed' the Rosary to children like we feed them their food: first, little amounts of soft stuff; then, a bit of solid food to chew on; then, a bit more.

- Mum and Dad should try to pray a Rosary together at least once in a while, but invite the children to join you. Have them pray just one decade with you, then permit them to go elsewhere in the house for some quiet activities on their own while you finish.

- After they get accustomed to one decade, ask them if they'd like to say a second one - and let them lead it! You may be surprised.

Pastoral Ponderings

It's hard to believe that March will end and April will begin this week. Time flies!

But with a new month come more opportunities to grow in prayer during Lent. This weekend we will have **First Friday** (Masses at 9am Acacia, 5.45pm in church) and **First Saturday** (Rosary at 9.35am, Mass at 10.00am).

Have you made the Nine First Fridays and the Five First Saturdays at least once in your life? If not, why not start one of these devotions this very weekend? It won't hurt, and it can only help.

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Thank you to everyone who came to the special Holy Hour this past Friday evening from 11.00pm to 12 midnight, as we joined the Holy Father who at that same hour in Rome pronounced the **Consecration of Russia and Ukraine** to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. At last it has been done!

Some say previous popes (Pius XII, Paul VI, John Paul II) had made the Consecration. Alas, although they said public prayers of Consecration, Russia was not singled out, but 'lumped in' with all the other nations of the world.

Now some say that by linking Ukraine to Russia, the Consecration is similarly invalid. But we must remember this: in 1917, when Our Lady made her request to consecrate Russia to her Immaculate Heart, the Ukraine was only a region of Russia and not an independent nation (hence, 'the Ukraine').

So by consecrating Russia and Ukraine together, the Holy Father is remaining faithful to the original intention of Our Lady. And how appropriate in our day, when Russia and Ukraine are at war with one another. May this Act of Consecration hasten the day of peace for all, especially Russia and Ukraine.

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I know some people don't like to pray the **Rosary**. They find it boring, repetitive, mind-numbing - or all of the above.

Let me first say this: name for me a saint in the past millennium who did not pray the Rosary. You can't! And the Saints were human beings just like us. But they knew how to pray.

Until the past fifty years or so, people were much more accustomed to silence, to sitting still, to being able to reflect by simply resting or taking a walk outdoors. The Rosary requires quiet reflection.

Today, we are always 'on the go'. Even when we are home on our own, or alone in the car, we have to be 'switched on' - the TV, the radio, the earbuds or whatever - we crave noise. Even when we go to bed, some of us have to have 'white noise' to sleep.

Think about this, good people. To pray the Rosary profitably requires quiet, stillness, and reflection. **The problem isn't the Rosary - the problem is us.**
