# Pastoral Ponderings

The visit to our parish of Cardinal Souraphiel, the Archbishop of Addis Ababa, during his tour of Australia, has raised some questions: exactly what is a cardinal, what does a cardinal do, and how does a priest become a cardinal?

The word 'cardinal' comes from the Latin word 'cardo', which means 'hinge' or 'pivot'. Cardinals are the 'hinges' upon which the doors of the Church's government hang. The heads of many Church ministries are usually cardinals.

But there are three ranks of cardinals: cardinal bishops (who head Church offices in Rome, or who lead the various Eastern churches, e.g., Patriarchs of Jerusalem, Alexandria, etc), cardinal priests (archbishops of important cities in the world) and cardinal deacons (bishops from smaller dioceses).

Cardinals are advisors to the Pope, who calls them to Rome for special meetings called 'consistories' With their experience, either in Church ministries or 'on the ground' in local dioceses, they advise the Pope on important issues of the day.

Of course, the most notable task of the cardinals is won't get credit for your donation. Please | to elect a new Pope when that office is vacant. But he can still attend consistory meetings and advise the Pope.

In the first centuries of the Church's life, cardinals were appointed only from the Roman clergy. > Until the mid 19th-century, laymen were sometimes given the rank of cardinal. These men normally worked in the Vatican doing special work for which they were qualified, such as finance. Then it became the norm that cardinals should be bishops, and that remained the case until Pope St John Paul II decided to name a few priests to be cardinals. These were old men who had served the Church valiantly in places where the Church had been persecuted.

For centuries, the number of cardinals was limited to 70. Recent popes have increased that number, so that more nationalities can be represented in the 'College of Cardinals'. Today there are 203 cardinals, of whom 128 are eligible to vote in a papal conclave. (Unfortunately, I cannot vote . . . but I can definitely have an opinion!)
