# The Wisdom of the Saints: The Church


The Church is like a great ship being pounded by the waves of life's different stresses. Our duty is not to abandon ship, but to keep her on her course. - St Boniface

# Pastoral Ponderings

I'm glad it's July: we're done paying our seven instalments of this year's insurance. This means we can catch up on our bills, and have a bit of money in the bank - praise the Lord!

It is really good to see that we have a refund on our Workers Compensation Insurance. They had our wages too high, so Leonie asked Catholic Church Insurances to re-calculate the amount, and voila! Pennies from Heaven!

Something else that makes me glad: the Plenary Council has been having its final session in Sydney this week, ending this weekend.

Many of us, priests and laity alike, didn't really know why a Plenary Council was needed. But I had some hope when the organisers invited all of us to submit our reflections and suggestions on how the Church could improve and move forward.

In 2019, about 85 of you joined in one or more of our 10 parish meetings to discuss what we felt are the Church's weak spots, and to propose ways in which we could all grow as a Church.

In our parish, we proposed these points, among a number of others:

- better seminary formation
- better training for priests in preaching
- a new approach to vocations promotion
- a complete revamp of Catholic education
- less bureaucracy, more visits by our leaders
- more reverence in liturgy
- more outreach to the needy

There were more points, but these are ones that I can remember off the top of my head. We had some very good discussions.

> Then, in November 2019, Perth hosted a national youth conference, and our parish hosted groups and bishops from the Diocese of Wilcannia-Forbes and the Diocese of Port Pirie. We had a beautiful Mass on a Saturday evening - our visitors were amazed at several things:

- the splendour of the liturgy: music, incense, etc
- the number of families, children & young adults
- the strong participation in prayers and singing

At the dinner we provided in the school hall after the Mass, I spoke with the visiting bishops, and we discussed the Plenary Council.

They complained about the same thing: their people offered many good, constructive points, but they were ignored by the Council organisers.

Instead, it seems the Council is promoting a number of 'woke' issues. More about this next week.
