Pastoral Ponderings

The Wisdom of the Saints: Patience & Perseverance

When the holy women went to the tomb of Christ early on Easter Sunday morning, seeing that it was

empty, they left - all but Mary Magdalene. She stayed behind, praying at the tomb, and so she was the only one to see the Risen Christ. Thus we see that perseverance is essential to any good deed, including

prayer, as Our Lord Himself, the voice of truth, tells us: "Whoever perseveres to the end will be saved."

Anthony, in his cave in the desert of Egypt, addressed the vision that appeared to him: "Where were

you? Why didn't you appear in the beginning of my troubles, so that you could stop my distresses?'

And a voice came to him: "I was here all the time, Anthony, but I waited to observe you in your

struggle. And now, because you have persevered and were not defeated, I will be your Helper for ever,

Let your understanding strengthen your patience. Look forward with serenity to the joy that follows

It was so hard for me to restrain my impatience that I was bathed in sweat. - St Thérèse of Lisieux

and I will make you famous everywhere." - St Athanasius, in his Life of St Anthony the Hermit

This weekend's First Reading presents the virtue and the importance of perseverance in prayer.

Despite his old, aching arms, Moses kept praying during the battle between the Israelites and the Amalekites until Israel won. But note this: Moses needed the support of his brother Aaron, and their good friend Hur, in order to keep his arms lifted up in prayer and blessing. Despite the odds, Israel won the battle.

We should all pray to God on our own - frequently, and with confidence.

But today we are reminded of the need of support in prayer. This is why we come together for Holy Mass every weekend. This is why we pray Our Lady's Rosary together, whether before Mass on these days of October, the month of the Rosary, or fortnightly on Tuesday mornings when we pray for our adult children and grandchildren who are not praying, not going to Mass, not being nourished by the Holy Eucharist.

Because we share the experience of frustration and even rejection in our families over non-practice of the Faith, we can support one another. We can turn to one another for encouragement. We gain new strength, to persevere in prayer, knowing that our good God will grant our prayer - in His good time, and in His good way.

In the Second Reading, St Paul advises his disciple St Timothy - and us as well - to proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. . . call to obedience, but do it with **patience** and with the intention of teaching.

And we can best proclaim and teach the message by living it, by setting a good **example** of how a faithful Catholic should live. Words can go only so far; actions speak more loudly.

In today's Gospel, Jesus reminds us not only to pray constantly and persistently, but to build our prayer on a **relationship** with God that is loving and very trusting.

As the National Census has reminded us, fewer and fewer people in this country believe in God, much less turn to Him in prayer. But as He proved in Israel's battle with the Amalekites, God prevails even against the odds. And He will hear us, too.

I'm in Jamesville NY, enjoying seeing many friends here. This present weekend I'll be in Bellevue NE with my Aunt Alice and other relatives who can make the journey there. Then off to Chicago and Milwaukee. It's so good to see everyone again!

A Short Meditation from The Imitation of Christ by Thomas à Kempis (1379-1471)
