The Wisdom of the Saints: Hope

Believe in God with all your might, for hope rests on faith, love on hope, and victory on love; the reward will follow the victory, and the crown of life will be the reward. - St Nicholas of Flüe

Ch. 16 (cont.): If you cannot make yourself as you would like to be, how can you expect to have another person entirely to your liking? We would gladly like others to be perfect, yet we fail to correct our own faults. We want others to be strictly corrected, yet we are unwilling to be corrected ourselves.

Other people's far-ranging freedom annoys us, yet we insist on having our own way. We want others to be tied down by rules, yet we will not allow ourselves to be held in check in any way at all. It is so evident how rarely we think of our neighbour as ourselves!

If everything were perfect, what would we have to endure from others for God's sake? But now God has so arranged things that we may learn to bear each other's burdens, for no one is without faults, no one is without burdens or troubles.

Pastoral Ponderings

I'm in my second week with my Aunt Alice at her home in Bellevue, Nebraska. Considering that both of us are used to living alone, it's a minor miracle that we haven't killed each other yet!

But we're actually having a good time together, and I'm very impressed with how well she does at her age. She turned 91 last Friday, so I took her, four of her friends and her parish priest out for lunch at her favourite restaurant in Omaha.

She was a bank vice-president for years, and she still helps with the Monday morning accounting of the parish collections, and also serves as treasurer of the local chapter of Catholic Daughters of America. She gets out and about quite a bit (as I told you, she still drives at 91 - which is a bit scary for me as her passenger, but she actually does well). Everyone in church seems to know her.

But a lot of the people know me, too - I've been coming here since I was 16, and I'll be 73 in July, so this is like a second home to me.

I've been offering Mass in the parish. They, like us, have music at all weekend and feast day Masses: cantors plus a guitarist or guitarist & pianist There is an organ, but no one plays it (and I haven't volunteered!).

The people sing well, but I must say that music in our parish is several notches above theirs in terms of quality and variety of music. All of their music is 'folk music' - and while I think "Be Not Afraid" and "On Eagle's Wings" are fine songs, a steady diet of music like that can be a bit dull.

At St Paul's we try to use the entire treasury of church music: Gregorian chant, Renaissance polyphony, traditional 19th century hymnody, good 20th century classical music, and more recent folk music. This is what Vatican II urged us to do: to use all the richness of church music in our worship.

When I'm in the States, I go on my 'pilgrimage of food': Mexican, Jewish deli, German, Bohemian, BBQ, etc. - things I can't get in Perth.

You may say, "We have Mexican food and BBO in Perth!" Yes, but they're only a vale reflection of what is on offer in the States. Mmmm!

And there are the traditional diners (like you see in the movies!) where my aunt and I have gone several times for breakfast or lunch. Corned beef hash & eggs, chicken fried steak (steak that is crumbed and served with sausage gravy), biscuits & gravy, and good ol' pancakes (BIG pancakes) with an array of toppings and sauces.

While we eat, we reminisce about times past. And we've been looking at old photo albums and reading letters from WWI and WWII days - family history!
