The Wisdom of the Saints: Trust in Divine Providence

Father, I abandon myself into Your hands; do with me what You will. Whatever You may do, I thank You: I am ready for all, I accept all. Let only Your will be done in me, and in all Your creatures - I wish no more than this, Lord. - Bl Charles de Foucauld

A Short Meditation from The Imitation of Christ by Thomas à Kempis (1379-1471)

Ch. 15 (cont.): The person who has pure and perfect love does not seek praise for himself, but wishes only that God may be glorified in everything.

Such a person envies no one, for he sees God in everyone. He does not wish to take pleasure in himself, but he wishes to become blessed in God's eyes above all good things.

He believes that God is the Source of everything - like a spring, all good flows

In the end, all the Saints come to rest in God. Oh, a person who has even just a spark of real love should truly consider all the things of this world to be of very little importance, compared to God!

Pastoral Ponderings

This weekend's readings are especially beautiful and thought-provoking.

The First Reading describes how the early Church cared for the needy, in particular, widows and orphans. Ordinary men in those days had to labour hard to support their families, and their work often entailed some danger. They didn't have the fine tools and equipment we have today, nor did they have antibiotics. A nasty cut in a workshop, a fall from a scaffold, or even an encounter with a wild animal while tending the flocks, could result in fatal injuries. Hence there were many widows & orphans in those days.

The first Christians had their arguments: today we hear about a squabble between those who spoke Hebrew, and those who had adopted Greek customs and language - the Hellenists (Hellas is the Greek word for Greece, even today).

The first seven deacons all had Greek names. They were probably Jewish converts to Christianity who had Greek education and upbringing, and so could move easily between the Jewish and Greek Christian members of the early Church.

It's interesting to note at the very end of the text that "a large group of priests made their submission to the Faith". Amazing! These were the same men who had rejected Jesus, but now embraced Him.

The Second Reading begins with this idea of rejection, reminding us that Jesus had been rejected by the leaders of His people - a 'stone' considered unworthy of being a 'building-block' of the Jewish people. But now Jesus is the Cornerstone of a new people, the Church.

People rejected Jesus because they never took the time to get to know Him - and, not knowing Him, they could not love Him. If you and I are to know and love Jesus, then we must continue to take time to get to know Him. Congratulations on coming to Mass today to get to know Jesus a little better!

I'm at the Saturday evening Masses this weekend, but I'm leaving early Sunday morning to fly to the USA to visit my Aunt Alice, who turns 91 this Friday. Her husband died 24 years ago, and her son Philip died two years ago during the pandemic, so she is alone. And at 91, most of her friends are also gone. I think it's better to spend time with loved ones while they're still alive, rather than go to great lengths and cost to attend their funeral.

This Monday is also the 46th anniversary of my Mum's death, and the 42nd anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood. I'm looking forward to being with family for these events. I do miss them, and I do get lonely for them. So this trip is welcome.
