# Pastoral Ponderings

Greetings from Bellevue, Nebraska! Bellevue is a suburb of Omaha, and the home of Offutt U.S. Air Force Base. I'm an Air Force 'brat', and I spent part of my life on Air Force bases.

I actually loved military life - the precision, detail and pride that is put into every aspect of life. My brothers and I had to check the newspaper every evening for the exact time of sunrise and sunset the next day. Why? Because precisely at sunrise, two of us would be outside the house raising our flag: one to actually raise it, and the other to recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

At the precise minute of sunset, we'd again be at our post to lower the flag and then to fold it into a neat triangular shape, to be put away till next morn.

Every few months, the Base Commander would drive through the streets of base housing to inspect the houses. We cut the grass with precision - and I mean with precision: any stray blades of grass that wouldn't yield to the push mower (no power mower in those days!) would be trimmed with a scissors.

We scoured our metal trash cans till they were sparkling. Then, as the Commander drove past the homes in an open-top jeep, the families would line up along the footpath outside each house. The dads, in uniform, would salute, while the rest of the family would stand ramrod straight at attention. Two of us would hold our rubbish bins at an angle facing the street, so the Commander could inspect them for cleanliness as he drove past!

On special occasions the families could join the single enlisted men at the base mess hall for a meal I really loved that! It was the closest I ever got to eating at a restaurant or café until I was 16 - all of our meals were at home or at school.

For Christmas and Easter we'd always host two or three single enlisted men at our home for dinner, which they greatly appreciated. If it was Christmas, we'd have presents prepared to give them. It meant a lot to these boys away from their own families.

I fully intended to become a military chaplain, and was actually accepted into Officers' Training School in 1990. But then I was asked to lead a pilgrimage to Medjugorje. Some of my parish teens had been, and they came back completely changed to the point where I was afraid they had been seduced into a religious cult!

My Bishop said I could postpone joining the military until the next intake, so that I could find out for myself what was going on in that strange place called Medjugorje. Well, I went in June 1990 and I, too, was changed! I went again four more times within the next 12 months, and I've been there 19 times in total (although not at all since I came to the parish in 2009). But that's another story!
